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GIVING THANKS FOR GOD'S WORK

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Welcome to the new-look Trinity News! Inside you'll find stories and updates from the College community in a fresh format, and we hope that it continues to help you in your fellowship with us.

This semester in College chapel, it's been a joy to work through Paul's first letter to the Thessalonian church. It's a brilliant letter to consider in our context because Paul writes to a young church to lay out the fundamental elements of Christian ministry and life. And like almost all of Paul's letters, after the greeting he opens with a thanksgiving to God. Here we hear Paul thanking God for two particular things. First, he gives thanks that God is at work in the Thessalonians. God has worked faith and love and hope in them (1 Thess 1:3), as well as their acceptance of and suffering for the gospel (1 Thess 1:4-6). Second, he gives thanks that God is at work through the Thessalonians. God has used the lives of the Thessalonians as an example for believers to imitate in their repentance and faith throughout the entirety of Greece (1 Thess 1:7-10).

When we come to a thanksgiving passage like this, it is very easy for us to respond with anxious feelings about our own lack of thankfulness. Yet Paul does not write these words to make the Thessalonians feel guilty about their own hearts. Rather, he speaks of his thanksgiving to God because he knows that this is the best way to encourage the Thessalonians in their own walk with God. Rather than being told how well you're doing, how wonderful to be encouraged by being told that the Lord God Almighty is at work in and through you! The beginning of the year at Trinity is a little like the beginning of 1 Thessalonians. It is a time for great thanksgiving, as a group of students graduates and we thank God for all that he has done in and through them in their time with us at College, and pray that he would continue to thus work as they take the gospel to the world.

Whether or not you were able to join us for graduation, we always set aside the first Trinity News issue of the year to share the stories of those whom we are sending out into the world. Our hope as you read them is that you would give thanks to God for all that he has done for these graduates. We hope, moreover, that, like Paul in 1 Thessalonians, you might even share your thanksgiving with others so that God might strengthen his church as more and more people give greater attention to God's work in the world.

COMMENCEMENT & Graduation

This year's Commencement and Graduation was an evening of encouragement that reminded us of how God is at work through the College. Students, graduates, staff, alumni, supporters, friends and family gathered to praise God for his grace in and through all these people, especially the graduates and new students.

We also gathered to see Rev Dr Dan Cole installed as Principal of the College. Murray Thornhill, College Council Chair, led the installation which included Dan's affirmation of his trust in Christ alone, the absolute authority of the Scriptures, and commitment to prayerfully serve the College. College faculty and council members then joined Murray on stage to pray for Dan and his wife, Emily, as they begin this new season of ministry together.

God's faithfulness was clearly on display as 28 graduates (22 from degree studies and six from the Certificate in Christian Studies) walked across the stage to receive their testamurs. This year's graduates are already serving in various Word-based ministries, including full or part-time roles in churches and university ministries, or leading Bible studies and meeting one-to-one in churches and homes. Some are preparing to move overseas for long-term mission work.

The graduates expressed their gratitude to God in individual ways. Yet they all spoke of the riches of the gospel, and unity of the Bible pointing us to Jesus Christ as the common, powerful takeaway from their time at Trinity. The importance of the community relationships with lecturers, staff and each other was an equally recurring theme. A Master of Divinity graduate shared that the training he received at Trinity was never just about academics and head knowledge, but always targeted the heart. This was seen in the teaching and lives of the lecturers, just as it was modelled in the lives of the staff and fellow students. Our keynote speaker, The Rt Rev Darrell Parker, Anglican Bishop of North West Australia, powerfully reminded us of the nature and importance of Christian ministry from 2 Corinthians 2:12-17. This passage shocks the sensibilities (and senses) as the apostle Paul compares his ministry to marching as a slave in Christ's triumphal procession, and his preaching as an aroma of salvation for some but death for others. Like it was for Paul, ministry is hard, often unimpressive, and never straightforward. And yet, God uses weak vessels, "treasures in jars of clay," to proclaim the glories of God in the gospel of Christ.

The evening concluded with praise and prayer and many warm conversations, some going late into the night. As with every year, Commencement and Graduation provides a wonderful opportunity to enjoy the fellowship we have in Jesus Christ, and to praise his name for his triumph through the gospel. What a joy it is to serve him together!

FAITHFUL PREPARATION:

Reflections on Studying at Thin

For recent graduates Jacinta Patterson and Aidan Smith, studying at Trinity was more than just lectures and assignments—it was a season of deep learning, friendships, and preparation for ministry. Having completed the Master of Divinity and now stepping into their respective roles—Jacinta as the Membership and Kids Director at Providence Bayswater, and Aidan as a Ministry Intern at Vic Park Presbyterian—they look back on their time at Trinity with great gratitude.

Equipped for ministry

Now in full-time ministry, both Jacinta and Aidan can see just how much Trinity has shaped them—not just in knowledge, but in faith and confidence for the road ahead.

"The best thing about Trinity is that the lecturers are world-class," Jacinta says. Trinity's lecturers aren't just experts in their fields; they genuinely care about their students, investing time inside and outside the classroom. "They teach the Bible faithfully and help us see the holes we don't want to fall into," she reflects. Their wisdom has given her confidence to step into ministry.

Aidan wholeheartedly agrees, highlighting the invaluable guidance he received. "Trinity has given me confidence that when I bring God's Word to people, I'm understanding it rightly," he says. " It doesn't mean I won't get things wrong at times, but Trinity has kept me clear on the main thing the gospel of Jesus Christ."

But more than just equipping them with knowledge, Trinity has shaped their hearts. "You can't spend years in an environment where the gospel is taught, preached and lived out without it doing something to you," Aidan reflects. "You're continually reminded of your dependence on God, humbled by his Word, and have your heart gripped by the gospel. There are few better ways to start a lifetime of ministry."

Learning beyond the classroom

Both Jacinta and Aidan say that the conversations and relationships built outside the classroom also left a lasting impact. "Some say 70% of learning is on the job, 20% is discussing what you're learning, and 10% is being lectured," Jacinta reflects. "Trinity was that vital 10%, and a highlight for me was having a study buddy in Aidan for that 20%. I learned so much from chatting things through with him!"

Aidan shares a similar sentiment. "The conversations outside of class were always a highlight. Having the space and time to talk about life, ministry, and theology was a real privilege. It's the chats in the library, the prayers of friends, and the encouraging (sometimes challenging) words from lecturers that come to mind."

Having been supported by others through their training and journey to ministry, Aidan and Jacinta value the prayers of the Trinity community as they serve in their ministry roles.

Aidan says, "Please pray that my wife Jess, son Riley, and I will settle well into Vic Park Presbyterian, investing deeply in relationships with people. Pray that I will be discerning and encouraging as I oversee the small groups ministry. Pray that the leaders would be well supported, and that the groups would be places of great depth and warmth with one another as they live for Jesus."

Jacinta asks, "Please pray for God to help me to listen well to people as I consider what it means for each person to keep growing in their trust of Jesus. Pray that I would learn to trust God's timing and not grasp control for myself. Finally, that I would be able to prioritise things well in my ministry role."



INTERVIEW With Dan Cole

We sat down with Principal Dan Cole to talk about why he's excited about being at Trinity and taking on his new role at the College.

Tell us about yourself and how you came to Trinity.

I'm married to Emily, and we've got three teenage kids (as well as a groodle). I grew up mostly in the Eastern states, although I did spend some time on the mission field in Taiwan with my family as a teenager. It was there that God opened my eyes to how much need there is for gospel ministry throughout the world. So after uni, I worked as a youth pastor in Sydney before spending four years at Moore Theological College training for ministry. After college, I served for a few years as an assistant pastor. Towards the end of that time, I felt the call to get further equipped for the possibility of moving into a ministry of training others for ministry. After a slightly winding road, I ended up writing my PhD under Don Carson at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School (just north of Chicago). Towards the end of that process, a role teaching New Testament and Greek opened up here at Trinity. In God's grace and kindness, we've been here now for nearly eight years. It has been a great joy of my life to serve in a college that so clearly teaches the Bible as a whole that shapes the whole of life and ministry.

Why do you think Trinity's mission and work is valuable to gospel ministry in WA and beyond?

Our world and our churches have no greater need than the news of Jesus Christ. This gospel is what God promises to use to bring in the new creation. So God entrusts his gospel to every believer and every church to proclaim. Yet the infinite depth and piercing clarity of the gospel means those whom God calls to ministry (whether vocational or volunteer) have the responsibility before God to know and be shaped by this message as thoroughly as they are able. Trinity serves our churches and our world by equipping men and women for exactly this. We therefore have a twofold mission and work. First, we rigorously train students in how all the Scriptures proclaim the gospel of Christ. And second, we ensure students are trained in how the gospel shapes all their lives and ministries. Yet because we are preparing students for a lifetime of effective gospel-infused and gospel-shaped ministry, we structure our training around three invaluable frameworks-biblical theology for understanding every passage in the light of whole of the Scriptures, systematic theology for understanding every truth of God and his world in the light of all God's revelation,



and philosophy of ministry for communicating the gospel clearly and contextually. We believe that the robust training Trinity provides plays a vital role in preparing individuals with the deep understanding and love for the Lord essential for effective gospel ministry and service.

What are you looking forward to in your role as Principal?

Because I am thoroughly convicted of the value of Trinity's mission, the biggest thing I'm looking forward to is seeing God at work in and through the staff and students at Trinity, as well as in the wider Christian networks in Western Australia and beyond. Although I've been encouraged by God's work in many ways in my time teaching in New Testament and Greek, I'm excited about getting a higher-altitude view of God at work through the College as a whole in this role. I'm also looking forward to even deeper fellowship in the gospel with the wonderful, dedicated team that God has given to the College as we work together for the cause of Christ.

How we can pray for you and the College?

I would love prayer for three things. First, please pray that we would constantly be shaped by the gospel in all that we do at College, and especially in abounding more and more in love for one another. Second, pray that God would make us both faithful and fruitful in the ministry to which he has called us as we equip students for gospel service. And third, personally, please pray that God would grant me his gospel wisdom to humbly lead the College community well.

SENDING WORKERS

For about 20 years whilst in America I lived in a community that was surrounded by agriculture. I lived in the city, but not far from the city were fields of corn and soybeans as far as the eye could see.
